Independence in the homeland will participate



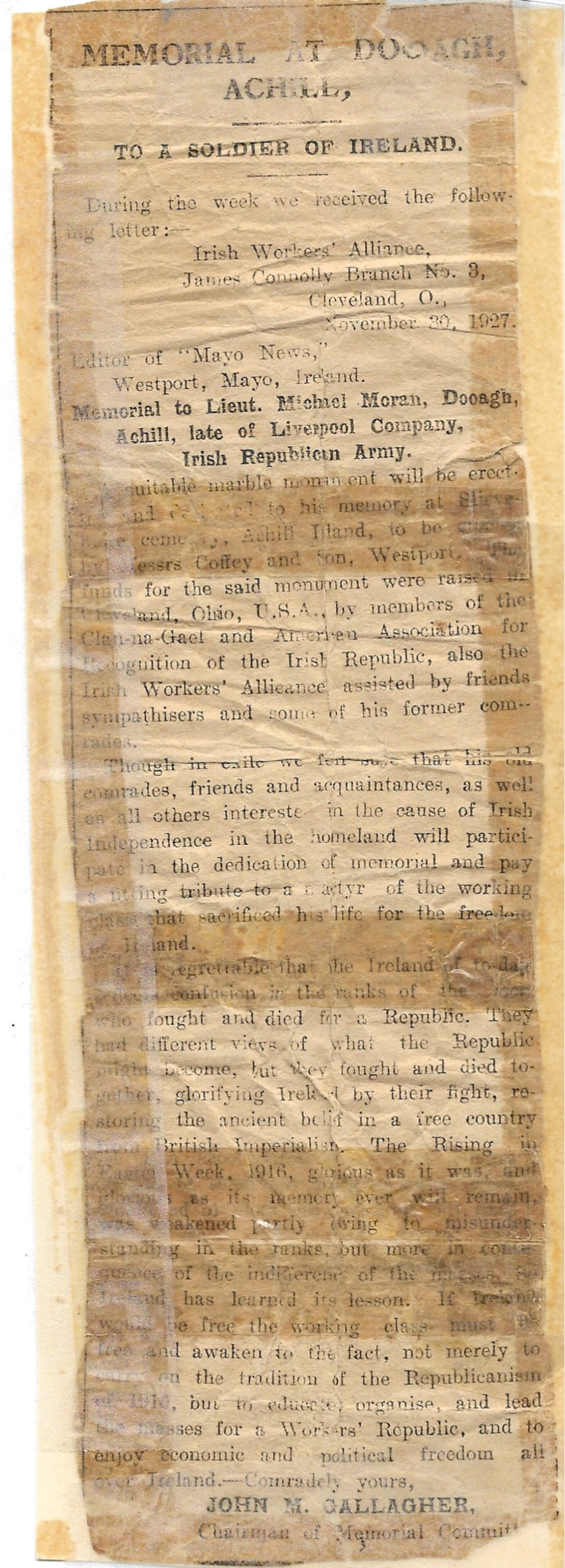

It is regrettable the Ireland of today reflects confusion in the ranks of the men who fought and died for the a Republic. They had different views of what the republic might become, but fought and died together, glorifying Ireland by their fight, restoring the ancient belief in a free country from British Imperialism. The Rising in Easter Week, 1916 glorious as it was, and glorious as its memory will remain, was weakened partly owing to the misunderstanding in the ranks, but more in consequence of the indifference of the masses. If Ireland would be free the working class must be free and awaken to the fact, not merely to carry on the tradition of the Republicanism of 1916, but to educate, organize, and lead the masses for a Worker's Republic and to enjoy economic and political freedom all over Ireland. — Comradely yours,
